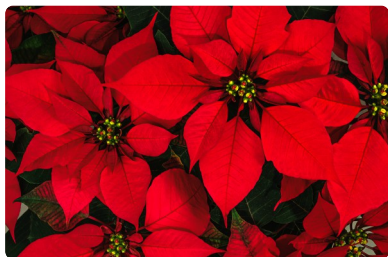

HRGC Bus Trip To Charleston

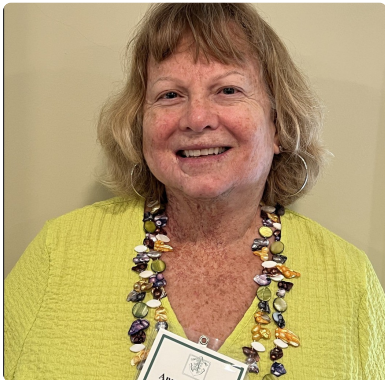

How to Make Your Own Decoupage Pumpkins

Allison Clock, who provided these lovely decorative pumpkins for the luncheon, has kindly shared directions on how to make a decoupage pumpkin for your fall tablescape.

Ingredients:

White pumpkin

Napkins with white or cream background to match color of pumpkin (I used Caspari)

Mod Podge - Matte or Gloss

Scissors

Fat flat (inexpensive) paint brush

Parchment paper

Lay pumpkin upright on Parchment paper..

Napkins: cut out small groups of leaves, more than you think you might need so you will have more choices when you select your groupings.

The napkins are usually three-ply. After cutting "groups", pull off one or two of the layers, on all groupings to create thinness. You want to do this before gluing begins, you may have glue on your hands.

Paint Mod Podge on an area of the pumpkin that is the approximate size for one group.

Press this group down gently with palm or two or three fingers together, trying not to slide the delicate paper.

TIP: Painting Modge Podge directly onto the napkins can cause the paper to shred.

Once all the paper has been applied, go back over the edges with your finger dipped in ModgePodge to seal or tighten the groups down or carefully use paint brush brushing or pressing as you go.

Cutting groups takes the most time.

Fine Arts and Flowers

On Thursday, October 24, 2024, thirteen members of HRGC traveled to Richmond to attend Fine Arts and Flowers at the Virginia Museum of Fine Arts. This biennial exhibition pairs artworks from the museum's permanent collection with interpretive floral arrangements created by members of the Garden

Club of Virginia, the Virginia Federation of Garden Clubs, and Ikebana of Richmond. Started in 1987, proceeds from the event support selected museum initiatives and exhibitions at VMFA .

Upon our arrival we gathered together with a mission to find our club's arrangement that was put together by club members Stacy Queensberry and Page Kremp, with research and planning help from Anne Harrison Harris. With 76 arrangements throughout the three floors of the museum we felt as if we were on a scavenger hunt! However, with many map readers among us we found our way, and when we turned a corner and saw the arrangement, we were all so proud to tell people that we were from the HRGC and this was our arrangement. It was beautiful and captured the artwork behind it so perfectly.

As a reminder our artwork was a painting entitled "Otto and Maschka Muller in Atelier" by Ernst Ludwig Kirchner. The bold, vivid and jarring colors and exaggerated forms of this painting were a big drawing point for depiction in floral form. Kirchner wanted to show expression of raw, unfiltered and distorted emotions to convey the anxiety and experiences of modern life. He also aimed to bridge old/primitive and new/contemporary artwork. Many flowers were chosen to represent old and new, loose lines of the bohemian atmosphere and tight buds for modern urban life of form and texture. The lines of the flowers will follow the shape of the skirt and movement of her body while also portraying a bold and rigid backdrop of the shelf and desk.

Flowers included were: Willow, blue thistle, purple statice, purple liatris, purple anemone, purple sweet William, yellow yarrow, yellow alstroemeria, yellow and orange carnations, yellow spray roses, orange hypericum, orange free spirit roses. Container represents old and primitive.

After swooning over our arrangement and taking many pictures, we ventured throughout the museum to view the many beautiful and creative arrangements that reflected all types of art such as paintings, textiles, statues, pottery, and much more. I think we were all in awe of the innovative

ideas that the arrangers came up with to depict the art they represented. After the museum several of us headed out to Short Pump for lunch at The Cheesecake Factory and then then did a little shopping at Tweed and Hobby Lobby. We all agreed that it had been a really fun day and that we were so proud of how Stacy, Page and Anne Harrison represented our club at the VMFA!

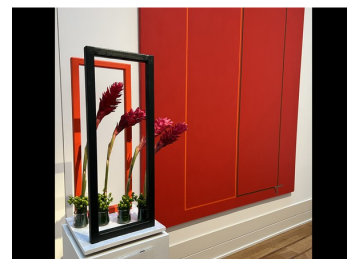

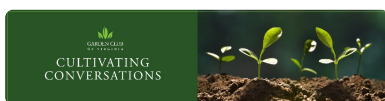
You've Been Bloomed
